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FOOD SAFETY ACT 1990

The government is introducing tight new regulations governing the handling and serving of food. These will affect everyone in the hotel, catering, and leisure industries. Environmental Health Officers will have significantly enhanced powers of enforcement and the penalties for non-compliance will be severe.

To ensure that your business will meet the requirements of the new Act, it is important to get the right training for you and your staff. One-day courses will be organised at Headlands Hotel in March, by the Hotel and Catering Training Company. Those successfully completing the course will obtain the Institution of Environmental Health Officers' Basic Food Hygiene Certificate. The cost of the course is £20 (excl. 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PARISH COUNCIL

A report compiled from notes taken during the meeting held at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, on Monday 11th. February.

Chairman, David Bolton, pointed out that Cllr. Symons frequently had to miss meetings to attend to District Council business. 'We are fortunate to have a councillor who puts his District Council work first,' he said. The viability of changing the day of Parish Council meetings will be raised at the Annual Meeting. West Country Housing Association Mr. Bolton introduced Mr. Matthews, who talked about the development at Hillson's Close, the types of housing to be available, the method of selecting applicants, and the possible rents to be paid. Applicants who have been living, or working, in St. Endellion, or one of the four adjacent parishes, for the previous three years will be considered. Tenants with low incomes will be eligible for full Housing Benefit. They will not have the right to buy their properties which would remain permanently in the renting market. The properties would have to be the tenants' main home, which will prevent holiday letting. The Association has the power to evict tenants if necessary. Local workmen will be used for maintenance work. As most of the applicants are single or childless people and many are already living here, there is little possibility of an influx of children at Port Isaac school. It is hoped that successful applicants will soon be informed, and able to take up occupation in May. Unsuccessful applicants will be kept on the waiting list in case of future 're-lets'.

Mr. Stokes passed a vote of thanks to Mr. Matthews, who had driven from Torquay to attend the meeting.

Chairman's Gavel

Before continuing, Mr. Bolton received from Dr. Barron the gift of a gavel for the chairman's use in keeping order.

Palying Fields Car Park

Mr. Phelps said the Council should obtain a firm specification from the contractors for the way in which they intended to reinstate the car park which had been used for their

vehicles and equipment during the work at Hillson's Close. They had not been charged as this would be contrary to the terms of the original conveyance, and it was also suggested that perhaps they would like to make a donation to the Parish Council, or the Playing Fields Action Group, in lieu of payment.

Finance

£500 to be transferred from deposit, leaving a balance of about £562. Annual Parish Meeting

New Seats

e. The 1991-92 precept will be received in instalments of £2,875 on 15th April and 13th September. Planning Applications

a. Listed building consent to reinstate calleried floor in restaurant at rear of building, Mrs. A. Smith, Slipway Hotel: 'no observations'.

b. Demolition of rear of building, rebuilding as ground floor kitchen and first floor proprietor's flat, and provision of two car parking spaces at front, Cornish Cafe, David Phelps, (Mr. Phelps declared an interest and withdrew from the meeting): The Council supported the application, but considered replacing the pleasant forecourt with its flowers with car spaces, as a retrograde step.

Public Discussion

Mrs. Coates said that she had been informed by letter that the donation to the Village Hall Heating Fund was to be discussed at the February meeting but this had not happened. She had to have the information before March to apply for further imminent grants.

A special meeting was arranged for Monday 18th February.

Mrs. Dingle asked if the contractors' rubble could be removed from the Playing Fields car park. Mrs. Harris said that as an architect she knew that an important part of a building contract were strict regulations governing the siting of vehicles and equipment during work. It was every contractor's duty to avoid obstruction and ensure safety arrangements were made before work started. They would normally expect to allow thousands
