ST. ENDELLION.—The 1st St. Endellion Troop is earning money for war needs by gathering and selling sloes and seaweed, and by doing various odd jobs for householders. It is also sending parcels of socks to the Front.

Since the war began the members have filled over seventy albums with picture postcards for the amusement of sick and wounded soldiers and sailors, for whom jigsaw puzzles are also being made.

The Scouts have been acting as patients in the bandaging instructions given to the local Red Cross first aid classes, and a vigorous start has been made in learning to knit cuffs for British troops.

A further novel effort of the boys has been the soliciting of feathers from farms, etc., whereby some fifty pillows have been filled for the wounded. The gardens of Port Isaac men who have gone on active service have not been forgotten; in several cases the troop has dug up and housed the potatoes.

The St. Endellion Flower Show committee have this year awarded members of the troop a medal and prizes for the best allotment gardens.
