



## **Kernow - Kosovo - Kent Connection** communities supporting each other

Caroline, Sheelagh, Andy, Ruth and Sam arrived at Prishtina airport last month with 8 suitcases filled with donated baby clothes and knitted blankets, one canvas of artwork produced by the children of Port Isaac school, a terrifying amount of camera equipment, copies of 'We're Going on a Bear Hunt' in English and Albanian and ... three huge bags of salt and vinegar crisps. The crisps were a wonderful taste of home for me, but everything else was to support the work of our Kosovo charity, The Ideas Partnership.

Over the next five days, the suitcases got emptier, and the new community centre (a building project that's almost completed) got fuller. At 12:04 on Wednesday 12th July Falmouth Coastguard tasked Port Isaac Lifeboat to investigate an empty tender with two oars attached drifting off the coast of Boscastle. Volunteer crew responded and launched the inshore lifeboat (ILB). Once on scene the crew had difficulty locating the tender and the original informant had lost sight of it. Search resources were increased to Boscastle Coastguard Team and the all weather lifeboat at Padstow Lifeboat.

The tender was located and deemed to have been in the water sometime and brought to shore. The ILB returned to station at 16:00hrs and was readied for service. Richard Hambly, Launching Authority for Port Isaac RNLI said "Approximately one third of all emergency call outs to canoes, kayaks, small boats and paddle boards are to those that appear abandoned or have come adrift. Yet the Paddler is perfectly safe. Please consider labelling boards and small boats with your contact details so that your safety can be confirmed." You can order coastal safety items, including

waterproof contact details stickers via the Maritime and Coastguard Agency.

# Websites of the M

This month's column has to be about the extreme weather events around the globe as it feels a bit as though we have entered a new phase in the way our climate is changing. The following is a bit on the gloomy side, but there are lovely sights in Cornwall this Summer. The butterflies are back and have a look at the picture of what might be a speckled bush-cricket. Beautiful colour

So, 25 years ago, back in April 2008 we had some very stormy weather, and this column covered the way the climate system was changing due to global warming and how this was disrupting our weather. In particular it described the northern jet stream and how its meandering around the Arctic was being affected by the heating of the planet. You can download the issue of Trio from then and read that article here https://tinyurl.com/Trio-april-2008

A BBC Horizon programme at the time, showed how so-called 'blocking events' - where the jet stream gets stuck - would lead to periods of extreme weather as heat is pulled up from the equator, or cold air from the Arctic - now called a heat dome and a polar vortex. The last few weeks have been stark reminders of these heat domes and that the systems that control the weather we experience are changing, and not in a good way. Details of the jet stream can be found on the Met Office website (based in Exeter) https://tinyurl.com/Met-Jet-Stream

The jet stream is just one of a number of climate control systems. For the UK another particularly important one is the Gulf Stream,




(the full name the 'thermohaline circulation' or 'Atlantic Meridional Overturning Circulation') that brings warm water from the Gulf of Mexico up around our coastline - and gives the UK, despite people often moaning about it - very pleasant weather. At the same latitude as parts of Canada, we have much milder conditions. Over the past few years scientists have been measuring the speed of flow of the Gulf stream using buoys and satellite data. They have found signals that the Gulf Stream is slowing and this, like with the jet stream, will affect the weather we experience. A good description of what is going on is in this article <a href="https:tinyurl.com/Gulf-Stream-slow">https:tinyurl.com/Gulf-Stream-slow</a>, which explains how the Gulf Stream works in some detail. The main driver comes from the fact that salt water is heavier than freshwater and as it moves from the Gulf of Mexico it cools down and also evaporates so gets heavier. As it meets freshwater in the Arctic it sinks down and gets circulated all the way back from where it came, when it comes up again. This circulation keeps the weather fairly stable, unless it is disrupted, which is what seems to be happening now.

As mentioned in the last column the ocean globally has been experiencing a heat wave - over 40% of the oceans are much hotter than they should be <a href="https://tinyurl.com/Ocean-Heat">https://tinyurl.com/Ocean-Heat</a> and this again will be contributing to the disruption of the climate.

The consequences of all this are the record temperatures across many parts of the world and also flooding in other places. Some things that are very important are not reported much, such as the wildfires in Siberia where large areas which contain huge deposits of methane, a potent greenhouse gas, have been in flames for months https://tinyurl.com/Siberia-fire

Let's hope the politicians here and worldwide get together and do more to prevent the worst effects that are coming down the track, but in the end it's down to all of us to do what we can. Fingers crossed.

# St Endellion Parish Council Contract & Maintenance Supervisor Report

The last month has been an unusual one for me as I was allowed to take annual leave during July which isn't normally a thing - one of my daughters was visiting from Australia, so an exception was made. Spending time with her was amazing, I'm grateful for the Parish Council's understanding ... and I still managed to do some work.

Walking the footpaths over the past few weeks was even less of a chore than usual! Not only did I take my dogs, but my daughter was able to come along too! Walks included around the Main at Port Gaverne, which hasn't been cut by the contractors yet, but it's still quite accessible and most paths are in good condition.

The monthly play area inspection was carried out and I had chance to take a more thorough look at a few points made in the yearly independent inspection, back in April, in regards to some potential future problems. The multi-play item, the big one with two levels, slide, fireman's pole and climbing ramp is on vertical wooden supports. These are showing some signs of weathering and have been monitored since the annual report. The struts aren't a cause of concern, but before they are it was decided to provide extra support for the supports. This should ensure the item can stay in use for the foreseeable future without issue and the monitoring will continue as it does for all the play items.

Since last month's *Trio*, Cornwall Council have approved the Listed Building Consent for the War Memorial. This means work for the additional stone to include the omitted names can go ahead. I'm hoping that it could be completed in time for this year's Remembrance Day, but can't guarantee it at this stage.

The only meeting I was able to make over the past month was the Full Parish Council. As it was Danielle's first one since taking over from Beth, as our Parish Clerk, I assisted her with Minute taking.

One thing I have mentioned previously, but is still a bugbear is the depositing of bags of household waste into the litter bins. One of the regular Biffa operatives was very unhappy on a Friday and Saturday having emptied a bin of litter only to check it within an hour to find it full of bags of waste. This was repeated three times throughout the day. The following day a similar situation. These bins are intended for the general public to place their litter into, not for holiday rentals/ second homes to dispose of their household rubbish. It's an offence and carries a fine. Also, should the street operatives be checked on, which is carried out routinely and the bin is found full, the operative will suffer a financial penalty. Okay, rant over!

A reminder that Residents' Parking Permits are available for the Main car park as advertised in last months *Trio*. At present a few have already been issued, if you require more info please contact Danielle at: stendellionpc@gmail.com.

I've dealt with a variety of things at the Main car park; replacing ticket rolls and emptying a machine for the enforcement company when they were unable to send personnel, rebooting machines after thunder and lightening and dealing with a mistake made by the parking app company.

Back to my comfort zone ... the loos! There's been quite a lot happening here. At the Main toilet block, the new motor to replace the hand washing unit was finally delivered. The company who provided it suggested sending an engineer to carry out the work at a cost of over £600. I explained to them that we would try to do the work ourselves and if we weren't able to do it I'd be in touch. It took Phil and me no longer than 10 minutes to take the old motor off, replace with the new one and test it!

A similar situation at New Road. The front of the hand washing system, around the sink areas, on both facilities was breaking up and not in a good condition. It took at least a couple of months for the replacements to arrive. But they were free of charge - I'm not really sure why. Something to do with the old ones, 'failing'. Anyway the offer of a technician was made. This time it probably took Phil and me about half an hour to complete the job! They look great, they work and only cost our time ... although, we did have to go back for maybe another 10 minutes to adjust the locks so that our wonderful Corserv operative could open them to refill the soap dispensers.

Shiela the lady who works for Corserv Cleaning is amazing. She is relentless in the service she provides and the loos are immaculate when she's working. Unfortunately, she has to take annual leave sometimes! Her replacement is not of the same stuff. Suffice to say that a complaint has been raised with Corserv over the lack of cleaning, while Shiela was away. A credit should be received on the months invoices.

The tenants of the Deli Box at New Road informed me the hand drier in the accessible loo wasn't always switching off. It's the type where you put your hands underneath and it comes on. But the problem was it didn't always stop. With Phil's assistance, actually more like he did the work and I assisted, we were able to remove the cover and clean the sensors. Job done! It now works as good as new.

Finally, on the last day of filming at Port Gaverne, of *The Famous Five*, right at the time of wrap on Friday evening I received a call from their locations manager. She also sent me a video, showing the problem, water cascading over the top of the traditional high level cistern in the Gents loo. As you can imagine, there was water everywhere and the stopcock for the whole block is right at the back corner of that loo! I explained this on the phone and I could hear instructions being given to a third party, who I assume was getting soaked trying to stop the water! With the time of day and the day of the week I felt it was unlikely to be able to get a plumber to come out, either straight away or over the weekend. So I called Phil! He's not really a plumber, but I was confident in his ability to replace the ball valve, which I had diagnosed from the info already provided. He stopped by a plumbing supplier on his way the following morning and with my encouragement everything was back to normal by lunchtime. And Phil was able to enjoy the rest of his weekend!

And finally, meter readings have been obtained for all toilet blocks in Port Isaac despite the spiders trying to intervene!

#### Other jobs to do in the garden

If you're growing tomatoes, pick them when they show the first blush of red they should come off easily when lifted and twisted and will carry on ripening off the vine.

Carry on picking fruit and vegetables, if you've got too much, give away to friends or freeze it. If a holiday beckons, ask a neighbour or friend to pick your beans so they are still productive when you return home. If they're allowed to develop seeds, they'll give up for good.

Snails love warm, wet weather. Control them with beer traps, collecting them at night for disposal, or try deterrents such as eggshells.

The weeds should have slowed down but as soon as there is a note of autumn in the air, there will be a rush of weed seedlings popping up so keep up the weeding.

Sempervivum are tough and drought tolerant making them easy to grow in pots, troughs or old sinks, in rockeries or even in nooks in walls. Plant in well drained, gravelly compost with a top layer of grit to protect them from wet soil. As each rosette is a single plant (the hen) you can pot up the offsets (chicks) to get more plants.

Echeverias are a great choice for a window-box display that you can love and leave all summer although you need to bring them indoors before the first frosts. Keep them tightly potted in gritty compost, in pots of free draining soil in a sunny bed.

# Cooking with Mr & Mrs L

# Mr L's Ultimate Beef Chilli

This ain't a quick dish, but by god, tis worth waiting for ... trust me!

Ingredients (6 people):

2kg diced beef(chuck steak) 1 cup strong coffee 2 red peppers 1 star anise

2 red onions 2 cloves

2 x 400g tins chopped tomatoes 2 tbsp dark brown sugar

1 tsp Coriander seeds 1 pint chicken stock. 1 tsp Ground Cumin 1 tsp chipotle paste.

Cinnamon stick Chilli flakes 1x 400g tin kidney beans

6 cloves garlic 1tbsp fish sauce

2 red chilli 1 tbsp soy sauce

Olive oil 2 tbsp balsamic vinegar

1 tsp Oregano 6 fresh tomatoes

#### Method:

Firstly, roughly chop the peppers and chilli and toss lightly in some olive oil and put in a tray and into a pre-heated oven for 35 mins. Meanwhile dry roast the coriander seeds, cumin, cinnamon stick, cloves and star anise for a couple of minutes. Put to one side.

Then cook the diced beef in small batches to seal the meat. Then add the oregano and chilli flakes and toss together.

Next remove the cinnamon stick from the spice mix and grind the remaining spices.

Take the pepper mix out of the oven add tinned tomatoes and put the mix into a blender and blitz till smooth. Once smooth

add coffee, fish sauce, balsamic vinegar, soy sauce, sugar and stock.

Then dice the onions and chop the garlic and fry till soft over medium heat for about 5 mins then add this to the meat and pour the "sauce" over it and return to a medium to low heat. Cover with a lid and cook for 3 to 4 hours . With about an hour to go add the kidney beans. Finally season your chilli and serve with sour cream and

# Mrs L prefers to graze

At this time of the year, I find it hard to stick to any particular meals and sometimes just want to graze ...

Below are a trio of recipes to make healthy dips to go with any bits of leftover salad vegetables or other vegetables you can dip, and at least it isn't too unhealthy.

## Perfect Hummus

400 g tin chickpeas, drained and rinsed 3 tablespoons of lemon juice (or more to taste) 6 tablespoons of extra-virgin olive oil 4 teaspoons of tahini Two garlic cloves, crushed 1 teaspoon ground, Cumin Pinch of salt 3 tablespoons of water as required 1 teaspoon of paprika

Blend the chickpeas, lemon juice, olive oil, tahini, garlic, cumin, salt, and water in a food processor until you have a creamy purée. Serve it with a drizzle of olive oil and a sprinkling of paprika.

## Smoked Fish Pate

1 fillet smoked mackerel or trout 3 tablespoons full fat, soft cheese. Squeeze of lemon juice, 1 to 2 teaspoons of hot horseradish sauce

Remove the remove the skin from the mackerel fillet and mash the Fish in a bowl with the cheese and lemon juice. Season the mixture with black pepper and add the hot horseradish sauce to taste, serve pâté on thick slices of cucumber or with vegetable batons as a dip.

### Tzatziki

Two small cucumbers 300 mils full fat Greek yoghurt, juice of one lemon 2 to 3 garlic cloves, finely grated 1 tablespoon of olive oil, 1 teaspoon of paprika

Peel and seed the cucumbers (by cutting in half and scraping a teaspoon down seeds) then grate or finely dice them. Combine them in a bowl with yoghurt and all the other ingredients and a pinch of salt and black pepper.

Clean water on tap is something we take for granted. Prior to a proper piped water scheme, getting this essential of life meant a daily task of carrying buckets down to a village well and bringing it all back home. Water quality, however, was a secondary consideration. This came home to the village in February and March 1894 when there was an outbreak of typhoid causing many residents to be taken seriously ill, and two school children died: 14 year old Francis George Brewer, and 9 year old James William Leathlean. Typhoid is a water-borne disease for which the primary cause is contamination by sewage. The well in question was likely where the pump now stands in Middle Street which, in Victorian times, was known as Well Street.

This outbreak undoubtedly spurred the Bodmin Rural Sanitary Authority into as speedy a form of action as any bureaucracy can manage. At its meeting in April 1894, it resolved to

'extend the drainage at Port Isaac to connect nineteen additional houses'.

In the absence of a proper sewage system, which did not come until the 1970s, the 'drainage' referred to presumably just took everything out into the harbour. It was almost a year later, when the Cornish and Devon Post of 16th March 1895 reported that the newly formed Endellion Parish Council had asked the District Council

'to consider a pure water supply for the town of Port Isaac, and it is generally believed that a plentiful supply may be had at Mine Pit Corner, near St Peter's Church'.

At that time, almost all of Port Isaac was below the church, so there was little chance of human waste contaminating the water at this location. In July 1895 the District Council met at Port Isaac to 'give final instructions for the water supply'. In September the Parish Council reported

'The water question for the town is also making rapid headway, and soon there will be very little to complain of in the comfort of Port Isaac. Visitors are still coming and going and express their highest satisfaction with the place'. Interestingly, at that same meeting the council reported it has 'been busy in arranging for the lighting of Port Isaac. Most of the matters connected with it are

settled, and it is definitely arranged to light the lamps for the first time about the fifth of October next'.

The October meeting reported

'A committee was also told off from the Council, to watch various matters connected with the management of the lamps for the next month.

The water supply for the town is also near completion'.

That neatly places a date on the pump still at Mine Pit Corner, the pump in Middle Street to replace the old well, as well as all those old square brackets still affixed to many properties in the lower village to hold the oil lamps.


That scheme was still regarded as insufficient, and in November 1901 a new Port Isaac Water Scheme was proposed involving piping water from Pendoggett, where the surveyor estimated 10,000 gallons a day could be obtained. In October 1902 the surveyor was now talking of tapping two springs at Lower Trefreock to get the 10,000 gallons a day. Five years later they were still discussing things, with tempers fraught at some meetings, but the scheme was abandoned in July 1907 when the Local Government Board refused to sanction the loan on the grounds of the inadequacy of the scheme. Following a public meeting in Port Isaac on 22nd June 1908, at which several spoke of there being no need for a water scheme, the Port Isaac Water Scheme committee produced a report with four options to get the necessary water; 1) from Poltreworgey Mine, 2) from Grey Lake at Davidstow a scheme being pursued by Camelford and Delabole, 3) acquiring Earl Fortescue's supply at Treore, or 4) sinking their own artesian well. This got little further, with a report in November 1909 on option 3, where the Parish Council's views on Earl Fortescue's terms were

'that the scheme was prohibitive, the terms exorbitant, and it would be fatal to the welfare of Port Isaac'.

The committee still pressed on, and in April 1912, after the County Council acquired Poltreworgey Farm, it offered the use of the stream for an annual payment of £10 (about £1,000 today), which was also regarded as exorbitant.

The First World War put everything on hold, but in November 1919 there was an attempt to revive the Port Isaac Water Scheme using water from Poltreworgey mine. However, there were people in North Cornwall thinking on a bigger scale, and in January 1920 the Port Isaac Committee were looking at asking Camelford Rural District Council if they were willing to take up the question of a grand scheme for supplying North Cornwall from a collecting reservoir on Bodmin Moor. with estimates of 400,000 gallons of water daily being available. This scheme was similar to option 2 in the 1908 recommendations. Such a scheme had been discussed between the two councils in 1914 but was halted by the war. This North Cornwall Water Scheme was estimated to cost £45,000 (about £1.7 million today). Details of the scheme were reported in the Cornish Guardian of 16th December 1921, with Councillor S. T. Button of St Tudy being the lead promotor. Apart from the benefits to the people of North Cornwall, water-poor farms would be able to improve their land. The effect of a lack of water on local tourism had hit Tintagel hard after visitors left in droves. This was followed by a bad newspaper headline 'Tintagel has a great future, but its great need was a better water supply'. The government were providing funds to schemes that helped the unemployed, and Councillor Button felt the scheme could access such funds by employing those in the district.

Things moved ahead with the appointment of Captain J. E. Jenkin as surveyor in January 1922 to advise the joint committee of Camelford and Bodmin councils. The Surveyor's very encouraging report was set out in the Cornish Guardian of 29th June 1923 at a lower estimate of £31,000. The plan had 22 miles of 8 inch pipeline from Crowdy Marsh on Bodmin Moor via Camelford to Delabole, where there was a spur going off to Tintagel with the main pipeline continuing down to Pentire (Polzeath). There were to be three reservoirs, a small 50,000 gallon one on Crowdy Marsh (the 225 million gallon Crowdy Reservoir was not built until the



1970s), a 98,000 gallon one at Delabole and a 300,000 gallon one at Endellion, with a spur off to Port Isaac. A further spur went down to Rock.

On 3rd December 1923 a Ministry of Health Inspector held an inquiry at Delabole where interested parties expressed their views. Mr S N Stephens for St Endellion Parish Council stated that the scarcity of water in 1921 was terrible, with sea water being used for flushing purposes. Building operations on sites purchased years earlier were held up for want of water. In March 1924 the Ministry of Health granted a provisional order for the scheme to proceed. This received parliamentary approval, and in August 1924 seven councillors from Bodmin Rural Council were appointed to it, including Councillor Button who had been the prime mover of the scheme, and Councillor Symons from Port Isaac. After receiving considerable government financial assistance, work finally commenced with a cutting of the first sod on 25th November 1925. In December 1926 it was reported that the General Strike had delayed work due to the coal shortage, and their suppliers were short of materials to make the pipes, so the completion was

extended to March 1927.

After the minor trials and tribulations to be expected on such a major local project, the work was completed in time for a royal opening. At 12.15pm on Friday 10th June 1927 the Prince of Wales (later King Edward VIII) attended at Lower Moor for the ceremonial turning on of the taps.

Councillor Button, as

Chairman of the Joint Water Board, gave a speech to welcome the Prince and set out the efforts to bring the scheme to fruition. The Prince replied 'I am very happy to inaugurate this scheme, which has already shown success and will be a great stimulus to building in the area of distribution. Your courage and confidence in undertaking the great operation has been justified. The ratepayers will benefit from what is undoubtedly a sound commercial business.' He then turned to Councillor Button 'I believe the original idea of the scheme was yours and it says much for your energy and enthusiasm. I am now very happy to turn on the water.' With a twist of the Prince's hand, North Cornwall had water on tap at last.

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
