



It was a busy day for Port Isaac RNLI with two shouts on 17th September.

The first came in at 1708 to reports of a kayaker and a paddleboarder who appeared to be struggling to make it back to shore just off Castle Rock at Port Gaverne. The D-Class inshore lifeboat was launched and on arrival the volunteer crew carried out a shore line search. They quickly found two people who matched the description safe and well on the beach. This was reported back to Falmouth Coastguard who stood the crew down and the crew and boat returned to station. This is classed as a false alarm with good intent. If you ever see someone who you think is in distress please call 999 and ask for the coastguard. You are never wasting anyone's time.

Then it was only a short while before the lifeboat was again tasked at 19.30 to a lady with a suspected spinal injury at Port Quin. She had been coasteering when she sustained the injury. The lifeboat arrived on scene and after carrying out an assessment the casualty was then transported on the lifeboat back to the shoreline at Port Quinn. Both Boscastle Coastguard Team and Polzeath Coastguard were on scene where she was handed over to them for further care and assessment whist awaiting arrival of an

ambulance. The boat returned to station 21.40 and refuelled for service. We wish the casualty a speedy recovery and thank everyone for responding.

On the evening of Sunday, September 3rd, the Port Isaac RNLI's volunteer lifeboat was tasked by Falmouth Coastguard. The call came at 19:35 local time, reporting a person in the water, approximately 50 metres off the picturesque Trebarwith Strand.

The incident occurred when an individual ventured into the sea to retrieve their possessions, which had been swept away by the incoming tide. They soon found themselves battling against the unforgiving combination of a high spring tide and large swells, rendering them unable to return to the safety of the shore.

Promptly responding to the emergency, the Port Isaac RNLI lifeboat crew arrived at the scene, closely followed by the Coastguard rescue helicopter. The volunteer lifeboat crew located the person in the water, successfully recovering the man from the water. Radio communications were established to assess the casualty's condition, determining that immediate hospitalisation was not required. Consequently, the Coastguard rescue helicopter was released from the scene. The rescued individual was safely brought ashore and handed over to the Boscastle Coastguard Team, who were standing by to provide further assistance if needed. Port Isaac RNLI extends its appreciation to all who responded for their swift and effective response to this critical situation

This incident serves as a stark reminder of the perils posed by our coastal waters. Retrieving personal belongings from the water, especially during adverse conditions, is extremely dangerous and should never be attempted. Around 140 people lose their lives at the UK and Irish coasts each year, and over half never even planned to enter the water.



In the days of sail, our steep rocky coast with prevailing winds invariably driving onshore would have been a deathtrap in the event of any accident or miscalculation ...

A splintered plank of wood drifting into the harbour bearing part of a ship's name might be all that remained of such tragedies, and many ships would literally have sunk without trace. The national need for saving lives at sea was recognised by the formation in 1824 of the National Institution for the Preservation of Life from Shipwreck. A short while later, the fledgling organisation received the patronage of King George IV and the word 'Royal' was prefixed to its name. In 1854 it became the Royal National Lifeboat Institution. Well before its formation, local efforts from coastal communities would have been going on for centuries to do all that could be done to save an unknown soul whose only kinship was being a fellow mariner.

John Watts Trevan, writing in 1835, gives a lengthy list of ships wrecked off our shores in the prior three decades, and early newspapers had frequent reports of heroic rescue efforts, typically using open rowing boats. The Launceston Weekly News of 31st December 1859 reported on the award of the RNLI Silver Medal to 39-year old Port Gaverne mariner Charles Mitchell for his valiant efforts in saving the crew of the sloop *Busy* of Newquay in the terrible storm of 26th October that year and included these details -

'Conspicuous amongst all others on this coast was Charles Mitchell, a fisherman of Port Isaac. In the height of the storm of that night, the sloop Busy of Newquay was observed to be in imminent danger. Mitchell immediately mustered a crew of four men, who with himself proceeded through the tremendous surf to the wreck. Having succeeded in rescuing two of the sloop's men, their boat unfortunately broke adrift before the remaining men could be saved. Again and again Mitchell with fresh hands endeavoured with undaunted courage to save the other two poor men, who were now lashed to the rigging. At last, his humane efforts in three different boats after five hours of unusually heavy toil and risk crowned with success, and he had the happiness to bring the four shipwrecked men more dead than alive safely on shore about three o'clock the next morning.'

On 19th and 20th March1869 this coast saw a fearful storm with much loss of life and property, and it may have been this which encouraged the RNLI to provide a further three lifeboats for the county, bringing the total up to 17 in Cornwall. One of those was for Port Isaac, following a donation of £700 (about £69,000 today) by Mr Richard Thornton West and his wife Sarah to defray the entire cost of the lifeboat, plus the first year's expenditure of the station. They were keen supporters of the RNLI and had previously met the expenses of building the lifeboat station at West Wittering in Chichester Harbour. Mr West (born c1814) was a retired East India Merchant, who married Sarah Bowerman (born 1836), the daughter of an attorney at law, in 1863. In 1868, Streatham Hall, an Italianate mansion in Exeter (now Reed Hall as part of the University of Exeter), was built as their family home. When he

died in 1878 his estate was valued at £1,000,000 (about £98 million today).

The boat was named Richard and Sarah after its benefactors. Constructed by the RNLI's lifeboat builders, Messrs Forrestt and Son of Norway Place in Limehouse. London, it was 33 feet long and 71/2 feet wide having 10 double-banked oars, with self-righting, and self-ejecting of water, characteristics. After successful harbour trials in Regents Canal Docks, the Great Western Railway, who were supporters of the RNLI, transported it free of charge to Bodmin Road Station. There it was inspected by the Mayor of Bodmin and a large crowd. After decking the boats with flags, and the horses and attendants with rosettes, the procession made its way to Port Isaac via Wadebridge, St Minver, and Trewetha, attracting crowds and applause as it passed through. The full story is well told in the West Briton and Cornish Advertiser of 14th October 1869, which is reproduced overleaf.

The first major rescue came on 24th October 1870 when the Italian Brig Stefano Grosso got on the rocks at the western side of Port Gaverne in mountainous seas. With the aid of the rocket apparatus a line was got onto the vessel and 9 crew were rescued. One person slipped out of the cradle and was drowned. After difficulty getting over to Port Gaverne because of the crowds, a volunteer crew manned the lifeboat to reach the vessel and rescued two more

men and a boy. It was the same Charles Mitchell who received the RNLI's silver medal in 1859, that was further awarded the RNLI's second service clasp for his bravery in that rescue. That first *Richard and Sarah* saved 57 lives during its time on station but was replaced in 1887. It being also the gift of Richard and Sarah West, the slightly longer new lifeboat kept the same name.

West Briton and Cornwall Advertiser - Thursday 14 October 1869

### On Tuesday 5th October the boat came to Bodmin Road by rail and thence to Wadebridge for the night, and on Wednesday another set of horses, belonging to Messrs Clarke and W Guy of Endellion, took the boat to Port Isaac. It was necessary to pass St Minver on the way, and at about ten o'clock the boat was seen approaching with two flags hoisted from her decks, and the horses and their attendants and the lifeboat protectors were all adorned with rosettes. Nearly all the inhabitants of St Minver village and of the farms adjacent turned out to receive the boat and its cortege, and gave three hearty cheers for its success, the cheers being led off by Mr John Oliver, with the appropriate words "God speed the lifeboat".

At Trewetha, about a mile from Port Isaac, the boat was met by a concourse of people in holiday costume, and evergreens, expressive of joy and gladness while Pengelly band, in "Martial strains and sweet", gave something more than hilarity to the occasion. From Trewetha to Port Isaac was preceded by the coastguard of the district in full costume; the crew of the lifeboat in their "canonicals"; the chairman of the Sunday school teachers; the Band of Hope adherents. confident and cheerful; the members of the Foresters'

Society, armed cap-a-pic, all walking two and two; and the Pengelly band, of course giving time and impetus to the onward march. Some little difficulty was found in passing one corner of Port Isaac street, but the difficulty overcome, the boat ready to be launched. The Rev A. H. Smith of St Minver offered up an earnest prayer that the blessing of heaven might accompany the efforts of those who might man the boat, and rest upon those who in their consideration and charity had provided the beautiful craft.

Capt Ward then addressed the assembly, referring especially to the number of lifeboats at their various stations the very many lives yearly saved by their instrumentality and urging the people to assist in a work at once so benevolent and patriotic. His address occupied some twenty minutes and was delivered both with fluency and power.

The boat was then liberated from the waggon and liberated into the briny flood, Miss Trevan, daughter of Fred Trevan Esq., giving her the name selected "The Richard and Sarah" the names, we believe, of the honourable donors. The wind was overland at the time, and hence its ability to cope with the ocean swells could not be ascertained but that she was not heavy in the water was evident, for she almost kept pace with a six-oared gig.

Sails were also hoisted on her, and she went some distance from the land and proved herself to be a good sea boat. Nor was that all; she was taken around to Port Gavern a small port to the east where the slate from Delabole is exported. At Port Gavern two vessels were at anchor, and by the assistance of their tackle the lifeboat was twice upset to show the people how rapidly she would right herself if at any time capsized on the ocean.

The rocket apparatus was then tried, to show how poor sailors are rescued from a wreck, and the basket was passed over the line with great facility, and to the evident satisfaction of the many spectators.

It is calculated that many thousands of persons were present to do honour to the advent and the launch; and were glad to report that all passed off without anything like serious accident.

We had almost forgotten to say that a great many took tea in the schoolroom of the Methodist Free Church and that the proceeds amounted to over £11, which were given to the good cause. Mrs Fred. Trevan of Port Isaac and Mrs J. Guy of Trewint, were the managers, if not caterers, of the repast, and did the duties with all kindness and assiduity.

The frustration with the weather has continued to hamper rowing out of Port Isaac over the past month. # St Endellion Parish Council Contract & Maintenance Supervisor Report

At the beginning of last month's report I mentioned the unpredictable weather, well it hasn't changed much, has it? It's still unpredictable! This has made it tricky to carry on with the tidying of Meadowstile, although I'm hoping to get it done soon. Of all the opes this is probably the least used, but that doesn't mean it should be neglected. With that thought, I'd like to remind house owners that it's your responsibility to make sure your hedges aren't overgrowing into any road or back lanes.

The grass cutting contractors have cut in front of the houses on New Road and Cornwall Council have finally managed to clear the footpath between Trewetha Lane and Mayfield Road. They didn't get to do the top path from the steps and around the corner, but I'm hoping it'll be done in the next week or so. New Road car park grass banks are still waiting for the work to be finished.

I'm also hoping that work to repair the basket swing and conveyor belt in the play area will be done during the first half of this month. It's taken a while to organise, as everything alway seems to do, but it'll be good to get the whole play area back open.

Plus work is going on behind the scenes to get the new granite stone and bronze plaque for the War Memorial completed. I'm still optimistic that it'll be done before Remembrance Day.

At Trelights I can report that the road sweeper has managed to find it's way there again. That's three times in two months, which is about how the timetable should operate. This could be attributed to requests made by one of the regular Port Isaac Biffa street operatives to ensure a regular service is provided. The sweeper has visited Port Isaac too, also on a regular run.

There have been more breaks in the late shift of litter bin emptying, but the street crew have worked diligently and continuously throughout the summer to make sure everywhere is looking its optimum even with extra pressure to sort out the litter bins. So I would like to take this opportunity to thank them for their hard work.

While on the topic of litter bins. One of the large green ones from the Main car park has been moved to a new site on Parish Council land near the Deli-Box in New Road. Although there are litter bins in the Cornwall Council car park the volume of rubbish is so much that it was agreed to relocate this one.

The road works at the top of Port Isaac should be finished by the end of October. It includes three pedestrian crossings and a red crossing zone created at the top of Back Hill and Fore Street. Prior to the work starting I spent a couple of afternoons handing out flyers to the businesses and resident's properties in the lower part of Port Isaac and around the Peapod Courtyard. It was surprising how many folk had no idea what was going on, when or about the diversions that would be in place. More detailed info is available on the Port Isaac What's On Facebook page and the St Endellion Parish Council website, should you want it.

In last month's *Trio* I reported that there would be a tariff change on the three hour time slot at the Main car park to help cover the costs of the running of the public toilets in the parish and that its a bit tricky coordinating the three agencies who run the car park under the Parish Council's management. I can confirm that there were no hitches and the increase of 50p went smoothly. Sometimes its nice when a plan comes together!

As Danielle, our Clerk, was on annual leave for the September's Full Parish Council meeting I took the minutes. During this meeting a Working Group was created with three Councillors and myself to get the Roscarrock Hill public toilet refurbishment off the ground. As much of the preparatory work has been done it's time to get actual work started.

During the past month I've attended other meetings including: the Housing Working Group who are taking steps towards the possibility of an affordable housing project at St Endellion. If you require more info there's a dedicated website at 'stendellionclt.org'. I went so I'd be up to speed with where the project is at. The meetings are open so anyone can attend. I also went to a Community Area Partnership meeting that includes a wide area of parishes mostly located around the Camel Valley coming together to try to identify issues that could be improved, such as public transport, youth services and affordable housing for which there may be solutions either from a knowledge sharing point of view or financial one. Also to discuss further on building a wider picture of the condition of our part of the County.

I joined some of the Parish Councillors at a site meeting too. This was at the corner of Fore Street, known as Peace and Harmony. There's been a couple of incidence during the past few months of members of the public falling on the uneven road surface. Cornwall Council's Highways Department were invited to help establish a.) who's responsibility it is to carry out the resurfacing and b.) the exact extent of the area to be resurfaced. Since the meeting, at which, Cornwall Council agreed it would be the Highways Department to do the work, the area has been inspected by engineers and sprayed with markings indicating what's to be done. Fingers crossed it won't take long.

I mentioned earlier that the Parish Council have formed a working group to assist with the refurbishment of Roscarrock Hill toilets. This was at my request, as I felt I'd gone as far as I could with the preparation of the project and needed some guidance from the Members. Initially it had been suggested to invite builders to tender for the work and I've been preparing documents to this end, but it's such a complicated process and if it could be avoided things could be started sooner and managed easily as it will be broken down to separate phases. I hope by next month's *Trio* I should have more to report on this.

But now we've reached the exciting section of letting you know what else has been happening around the loos! To be honest it's not much this month, amazingly! Last month I said that the flush in the accessible cubicle, at New Road, had been repaired, it didn't last long, so now has a brand new one, let's hope it goes on and on.

Our regular Corserv cleaner had some time off, I was informed cover had been put in place, but it turns out that didn't actually happen, and well, you can imagine the rest! Corserv have been informed, so a reduction in the August invoice is expected.

At the Main car park loos, two of the hand washing units were being temperamental so I carried out the essential switching them off and on, while holding my breathe and hoping it worked. It did!

New Road and Main car park toilets have smart new signs explaining the need to charge for entry, with thanks for contributions received. A new sign was put up next to the

water refill station at the New Road loos too, informing anyone passing what it's for, as it's not that obvious until you get up close. Finally, the toilets at Port Gaverne will be closed for the winter by the time you read this.

### Scott Mann MP reports

I am pleased that the Prime Minister has announced changes in the UK's climate policy. For too long there have been those who argue ideologically that we should move even further and faster towards net-zero, with no regard to the cost to people's lives or how much we have already achieved compared to other countries. The UK is already ahead of schedule on our climate change commitments and has done more than other countries. We have had the fastest reduction in greenhouse gas emissions in the G7: down almost 50 per cent compared to 1990, compared to just 22 per cent for France, no change for the US, and an increase for China of 300 per cent. Technological advances have reduced costs more than forecast (such as offshore wind costs down by 70 per cent), and we have seen higher than forecast adoption of clean technologies like EVs. If you have concerns about changes to our climate policy then please get in touch.

Many of you will have seen the news that both Lloyds and Halifax bank branches in Bodmin have now been scheduled to shut in 2024. Cash remains an important part of daily life for many people in North Cornwall, which is why the Government has legislated for the protection of access to cash. The Financial Services and Markets Act will ensure the continued availability of withdrawal and deposit facilities across the constituency. The Act follows a detailed consultation on cash access which took place in 2021. Decisions on opening and closing branches are a commercial issue, and the Government does not intervene in these. However, the Financial Conduct Authority's (FCA) guidance expects firms to carefully consider the impact of any planned closure on their customers' everyday banking and cash access needs and consider possible alternative access arrangements for those who rely on in-person services. I am therefore pleased to learn that a banking hub will be introduced to Bodmin. This will ensure the availability of banking services in the town.

This week we announced millions of families will receive the second of three £300 Cost of Living Payments between 31 October and 19 November, helping the most vulnerable people with day-to-day costs as we deliver on our promises to halve inflation, grow the economy, and reduce debt. Putin's war in Ukraine and our recovery from the pandemic has seen inflation rise - this is a tax on people's income and is putting pressure on household budgets. That is why between 31 October and 19 November millions of families on means-tested benefits will receive a second Cost of Living Payment, totalling £900 across three payments with some families receiving £1,350 of support in total. Payments will be made automatically, and eligible pensioner households will also receive a further £300 payment later this year as an addition to the Winter Fuel Payment. This builds on our support with the cost of living, including energy bill payments, as we work to halve inflation, grow the economy, and reduce debt.

# Cooking with Mr & Mrs L

# a retro recipe ...

During a recent perusal through the "library " I came across some old Port Gaverne menus, circa 1980. Yes ... last century! This one was to be regularly found on the set menu.

### CANARD MONTMORENCY or Duck with sour cherries

1x6lb duck ½ cup port ½ tsp celery salt ½ cup cherry brandy Salt 2 tbsp beurre manié (equal Freshly ground pepper amounts of flour and butter ½ cup water mixed together to form a 4oz butter thickening agent) 1½ cups chicken stock 11oz jar of sour cherries (pitted)

### Method

Wipe the duck inside and out with a damp cloth and sprinkle cavity with celery salt and salt and pepper.

Place duck in a roasting tin, breast side up, add water to stop scorching

Cover the breasts and legs with buttered tin foil and roast in a hot oven for 30 minutes at 400°F to 450°F.

Reduce heat to 350°F to 375° F and continue to roast the duck until tender.

Remove the duck to a heated platter.

Pour off all the fat from the pan leaving only brown sediment and deglaze pan with chicken stock. Then add port and brandy and bring to the boil and then gradually add nuggets of the buerre manié and whisk till it thickens. Not too thick though!

Drain sour cherries and add to sauce. Either pour the sauce over the carved duck or serve separately. This goes well with buttered broccoli and mashed potatoes

## Kim's Banana Cake

know everybody makes or has made banana cake, but this is a nice easy recipe

Ingredients 4 oz butter 5 oz caster sugar 2 eggs 2 large bananas mashed 1/4 of a cup of warm milk 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda 8 oz plain flour 1 tsp baking powder Pinch of salt

Time 40 to 45 minutes Temperature 350° to 375°F

### Method

Line deep 8" cake tin with greaseproof paper. Cream the butter and sugar until light white and fluffy. then gradually add the beaten eggs beating well after each addition. Then beat in the mash banana.

Mix the warm milk and bicarbonate of soda and mix into the banana mix.

Sift the flour baking powder salt and stir into the banana mixture. Spread the mixture into the prepared cake tin and bake in a moderate oven for 40 to 45 minutes.

When cool I like to ice it with a Vienna icing which is 8 oz of icing sugar and 4 oz of butter mixed with 1 tbsp of sherry and 4 to 5 drops of vanilla





Trees are best planted anytime between now and Christmas. There are several advantages to buying a field-grown bare root tree or bush rather than a container grown one, including the fact that a bare root specimen is often cheaper. Also, the range of varieties is greater and some rarer types can be bought only in this way.

If you've ordered bare root fruit trees or bushes, use one of these mild October days to prepare and enrich the ground so that when they do arrive the chore of planting them on a cold day is all the quicker. Remember to order a stake with every tree.

Open the bag as soon as your tree arrives.

Plant as soon as possible - preferably in prepared ground.

Trees are often grafted, but it's possible to see where the tree left the ground by looking at the trunk - just replant to that level. Water well.





Barn owls are birds of prey, hunting and catching small mammals, mostly field voles, but also shrews, mice and sometimes rats! They have two extraordinary characteristics to help them hunt for food at night, such as incredibly sensitive hearing and the ability to see movement with very little light. Barn owl feathers are super soft and this helps them to hunt silently, but they are not very waterproof and get soaked when it rains. Barn owls have lop-sided ears, one is higher than the other, which helps them to pinpoint exactly where tiny sounds are coming from.

mulch.

Lay new turf now so the the grass can settle during the winter. Gather up autumn leaves and stack them in an enclosure of wire netting to rot down into leaf mould. This makes superb

Continue to plant daffodil bulbs, scattering bonemeal into the planting holes.


Finish planting spring bedding such as wallflowers, polyanthus and forget-me-nots. The latter make an excellent under carpet for tulips.

Start to overhaul herbaceous borders, split up congested clumps and replant them in soil refreshed with compost.

October is a bad month for gales, so check the ties on wall shrubs and climbers.

Leave dahlias and begonias in the ground as long as possible before lifting; tubers do most of their growing in the short days of autumn. Lift them only when the foliage has been blackened by the first frosts. Cut the stems off about 4" (10 cm) above the ground and stack the tubers upside down in boxes to dry out. Store them in a frost free shed.

Frost also stops tender fuchsias in their tracks. Shift them in their pots into a frost free shed or porch for winter.

**Divisional Members Report** – Interesting information in the August edition of Town and Parish Council Newsletter. There will be information on the Cornwall Plan 2025 Review available soon. Workshop at Wadebridge Town Hall tomorrow (12/9/23) to encourage orgs to apply for the Shared Prosperity Fund. County Cllr Mould met with new Housing Officer, Ray Holder, who failed to meet a local resident in housing need. It's likely Cllr Mould reports the need may be met without involving the officer. An ongoing issue with captive birds on private land at Trewetha is now under the management of Jason Drew, Environmental Officer who agreed to contact the owner of the birds to determine a solution to residents' concerns.

Playing Field Development Working Party - Cllr Button explained it's important to include all stakeholders and the summer being a busy time for all had not been a good time to progress plans, but a PFDWP meeting will shortly be timetabled to discuss how to continue progress public consultation with stakeholder. Cllr Collings disagrees with the process & considers members of the public should be included at this point. Cllr Williams explained key stakeholders' input was first required to establish the quantum of need/use both for funding application and to inform the format for full public consultation. Cllr Collings disagreed with this approach. Noted.

#### STEND\_HWG -

Chairman John Quilter attended to update the PC, which reference minutes of the public meeting, 4/9/23 previously emailed to Members. John Quilter reiterated that all meetings are open to the Public. The Planning Performance Agreement (PPA) entered into by the PC to progress the application is a process explained on CC website. Each service has itemised its charges in an iterative process, Cllr Williams added that HEP has increased its hours for 4- 8 hrs to include a site visit. Chairman Quilter emphasised the clearly identified housing evidence in the HNS the PC funded in June '22. Objections have been raised by the St Endellion Users' Group. Cllr Mould advised at full planning all stakeholders will have input.

a. PA23/05694 White House Cottage 3A Roscarrock Hill.

Non-Material Amendment (1) to Application No. PA21/06026 dated 24th November 2021 for Two storey extension to the rear of the property with glazed link between the existing summer room and dwelling (Revision to previously approved planning application PA19/09978), namely, to place vertical slate hanging to match existing to upper section of the summer house to mask steel beam.

SUPPORT with recommended conditions.

b. PA23/06515 2 Cliffside Port Isaac.

Proposed single storey extension with balcony terrace over creating an additional and minor internal re-ordering of an existing dwelling to include the adaptation of 2no. dormer roofs and the addition of 1no. dormer roof.

OBJECT Members found the proposal at odds with policies in St Endellion NDP. Loss of a parking space in a four-bed dwelling is unacceptable. We concur with the objectors, finding the proposal unneighbourly, to the detriment of amenity. Due to the elevated position of the dwelling sited in proximity to the SWCP.

Members were concerned for the protection of night skies, given the extensive glazing proposed, while the proposal moves the building line forward, setting precedent if permitted, for 'coastal creep', both of which fail NDP Policy. A first floor, full width balcony, in an elevated position with view across the ocean would undoubtable be used for social use, at detriment to the neighbours' enjoyment of

their privacy and their amenity, through noise and disturbance. In this and other respects the proposal manifestly fails to conform to NDP Design Principles and Character Area policies, to an extent members are of the opinion our NDP wasn't referenced. Indeed, the D&A makes no reference to the NDP or the townscape research used to evidence policy, for example wooden cladding is not in our vernacular.
