

Running the London Marathon in memory of their Dad, Mark Titcomb

Lucy May and Luke Titcomb are running the London Marathon in April in memory of their Dad Mark Titcomb.

Mark was a very committed, loyal member of the RNLI in Port Isaac and he passed away suddenly last May. In the early evening of May 14th 2023, the pagers sounded for an immediate launch. Mark rushed to the lifeboat station in his Shore Crew role, disconnecting the chargers from the lifeboat and the launching vehicle, and making everything ready for a quick launch. During the launch, Mark got a bit wet, so he said that he was going to pop home and change his jeans and go back. The crew saved the life that day of the person who had got in to difficulty. A short time later, Tara, Mark's wife called one of the RNLI crew to say that Mark was feeling unwell. The crew that were still in the boathouse following the launch, headed over to help Mark in his time of need, but despite the best efforts of the lifeboat team, and that of the ambulance service personnel, sadly it was not to be.



"We are running the London Marathon on behalf of the RNLI and in Dads memory because we would really like to raise as much money as possible to try and find a small way to say thank you for trying so hard to save him and for all their support. Dad was so proud to be a part of the RNLI and we are so proud of him".

"Running for dad is going to be so very tough but what makes it that much harder is it is going to be a year to the day that we last saw him".



Work is still being carried out on Roscarrock to get her ready to be shipped to the Isles of Scilly for the World Pilot Gig Championships, at the beginning of May. The inside is finished, the boat has been turned over, not an easy thing to do as it's 32" long, almost 10 metres. The outside has been sanded, primed and top coats are being applied.

Training for the competition has been ongoing at Roadford with plastic gigs belonging to Boscatle and Crackington Gig Club. Early Sunday mornings and have been well attended, with a few new faces giving rowing a go too.

The club's completed in the Three River Race, run by Caradon club at Saltash and as usual the course was gruelling, but that didn't dampen the spirits of the crew, who all enjoyed the experience.





Another tough race was hosted by Rock Rowing Club who organised a 'fun race' from Rock to Wadebridge and back with Port Isaac and Padstow boats entering too. Port Isaac had only one mixed crew which didn't really fit the format for the day. It was intended to be Ladies rowing up the Camel to Wadebridge and the Men's crew back to Rock. Port Isaac's team behaved in the manner appropriate to being in the gig 'Corsair' by rowing the return trip without a change in crew and heading straight off, getting across the finish line in first place!

Dolphin Class

As part of our history studies on World War II in Cornwall, our class embarked on a poignant journey to Bodmin Keep, a historical site steeped in the memories of wartime. Walking through its halls, we were transported back in time, surrounded by artifacts and stories that brought the past to life. We delved into how Cornwall was deeply impacted by the war and learned about the resilience of its communities during those trying times. The exhibits vividly illustrated the sacrifices made and the efforts undertaken to protect England's shores. Seals

The Seals have been delving into the significance of the RNLI, particularly as they commemorate their 200th anniversary. A representative from the RNLI recently visited us, shedding light on the vital role they play in ensuring beach safety. We discussed various ways to stay safe while enjoying beach activities.

March Highlights

Our Key Stage 2 Cross Country Team showcased their incredible sportsmanship at the Wadebridge Schools Cross Country meet. Our Key Stage 2 choir delighted the audience with shanty songs at Truro Cathedral during Songfest, while all students had a blast dressing up as their beloved book characters for World Book Day festivities.



The Government has given the go ahead for a huge seaweed farm just off Tregardock Beach.

The commercial farm will be the size of 140 football pitches and is sited around 1.5 miles from the shore. It will have navigational markers, with lights on, standing around 2 meters in height. There will be long lines and buoys and it will look like a giant brown square, seen from the coast path.

No-one living nearby knew anything about this and a campaign is underway to stop this farm going ahead without a full, open public consultation.

Since learning of the scheme Cory Rose, has launched a facebook page to inform the local community about the issues. She says: "I'm passionate about this beautiful place, but it's not about that, it's about wanting a proper consultation and for people to be made aware of what's going on and to be asked for their opinion."

This scheme has been granted a licence by the Marine Management Organisation and work could begin any day. The licence number is: MLA/2022/00180.

People living in Treligga, the closest community to the scheme, also knew nothing about the plans until a couple of weeks ago. There is outrage in the hamlet and residents are calling for everyone living nearby to come together to get the licence revoked and for people to be given the chance to have their say.

Everyone is being urged to write to Scott Mann, North Cornwall MP and to the Marine Management Organisation to ask for a proper consultation.

There are two further applications for commercial seaweed farms in Port Quin Bay, which are currently within their consultation period and which have drawn hundreds of people to public meetings.

Litter dropped on the street does not stay there. Rainwater and wind carries plastic waste into streams and rivers and through drains. Drains lead to the ocean! Litter waste adds greatly to the plastic surge in our seas. Once the plastic is in the ocean, it decomposes very slowly, breaking into tiny pieces known



as microplastics, which can enter the marine food chain and become incredibly damaging to sea life.


The main source of ocean plastic pollution is land-based - 80% of plastic in the ocean originates on land.



Up Close and Personal: modern art medals with a message'

Magnolias

It's important that magnolias get the right kind of soil and light, or their leaves start can start to yellow. They need a warm, sheltered, sunny spot and rich, organic compost. This helps the soil retain moisture, and that's all what magnolias need - rich, moist soil that never dries out.

You can plant a magnolia at anytime of year, but spring and autumn are best. Weed the area where you are going to plant your new magnolia and dig a hole that's twice as wide and the same depth as the pot the plant is in. Remove from pot being careful not to damage the thick, fleshy roots. Fill the sides of the hole with compost, firming as you go, and water in thoroughly.



Great Tit

This is the largest UK tit with a cheery two-syllable song. It has a green and yellow body and a striking glossy black head with white cheeks. It's a woodland bird that makes use of nest boxes to become a familiar garden visitor. It can be quite aggressive at a bird table fighting off smaller tits. In winter, it joins with Blue Tits and others to form roaming flocks which scour gardens and countryside for food.

Top up bird baths and bird feeding stations to encourage birds into your garden

Did you know ...

Sunflowers start the day facing east, then follow the sun as it moves across the sky to the west,. Each sunflower seed head comprises 1,000 to 2,000 tiny individual flowers.

You can sow sunflower seeds directly into the ground in late April or early May, or you can sow them in pots in early April. Fill a 7.5cm pot, or slightly larger, with peat free compost. Sow 1 seed per pot and cover with 1cm compost and water.

Tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, pumpkins, squash, cucumbers and avocados aren't vegetables - they and all crops that contain seeds inside of them - are fruits. The strawberry is the only fruit with its seeds on the outside.

Oak trees don't produce acorns until they are at least 20 years old.

Tree foliage doesn't turn orange, red or yellow in the autumn. As the weather gets cooler, leaves lose chlorophyll, the green pigment that masks their true colour in spring and summer.



Jobs to do in April

Top dress fruit trees in pots. Scrape off the top layer of old compost and discard it. Mix up a little fertiliser with new compost and add this to the top of the pot and water thoroughly. This quick fix enlivens up potted plants that you don't want to repot.

Weeds are growing fast so keep under control and hoe regularly.

Feed the lawn with an all purpose spring lawn fertiliser.

Deadhead spring bulbs as the flowers finish, but leave foliage allowing it to die back naturally.

Divide mature clumps of perennials and replant.

Apply a layer of mulch around your shrubs and trees before the warmer weather arrives.

Continue to remove faded flowers from winter pansies to stop them setting seed and encourage new flowers.



HANDS ON HOOKS FUN PALACE

In Port Isaac, our own Hands on Hooks community skill share has been running since October. We plan for this event to continue on a regular basis, welcoming everyone from the community of Port Isaac and the surrounding areas. This March, we met in the snug at The Golden Lion and again received a very warm welcome. We missed some of our regular crocheters but were delighted to welcome some new faces to join us crocheting and knitting poppies – quite a few poppies were made, and they were easier than they looked!

If you have been following our articles in the *Trio*, you'll have noticed that one of our aims is to encourage the community to participate in a Grand Project, which for 2024, is an installation of giant poppies to be displayed on the Platt as well as at the War Memorial and St Peter's Church to mark Remembrance Day 2024. We were lucky to find some volunteers with expertise in mounting Port Isaac displays to help us to put them up securely (or indeed to put them up for us)! We plan to continue to make poppies between now and October, using giant crochet hooks and giant knitting needles with outsize yarn. As you can imagine, we need an awful lot of poppies, both knitted and crocheted.

Thank you to everyone who has made a poppy so far, but we are only at the start and need lots more. What can you do? We would like as many of you as possible to contribute to this special community project by making giant poppies. So, you can, please join us at Hands and Hooks or make some poppies for us at home, between now and the start of October. We hope that you enjoyed knitting a giant poppy from the pattern in the March Trio. This month, why don't you have a go at crocheting a poppy using the pattern below? If you prefer to knit, we'll publish another knitting pattern in May, which I'm sure will be a hit! Please feel free to use your own patterns and any scraps of red and black yarn in your stash. If you have any spare red or black yarn, then we would appreciate donations – you can drop finished poppies and yarn into Hands on Hooks at any of our meetings or drop them off at the RNLI shop at any time.

Hands on Hooks Grand Project: Large Poppies for the Platt for Remembrance Day 2024 Simple Crochet Poppy Pattern

To make a large poppy, crochet with 2 strands of Double Knit (DK) yarn throughout to make the poppy robust. Use an 8-10mm crochet hook for a poppy of about 20cm diameter. We have used acrylic yarn to withstand the weather!

Yarn: Colour A - Black, Colour B - Red Crochet terms (UK): sl st - slip stitch. ch - chain. tr - treble



4 ch, sl st into first ch to form a loop

Round 1: 3 ch, 11 tr into the loop, sl st into 3rd ch, fasten off (12 stitches

Change to Colour B (red)


Round 2: Attach yarn anywhere in the circle, 3 ch and 1 tr into the same space, * 2 tr into next space (repeat * to end), sl st into 3rd ch (24 stitches)

Round 3: 3 ch and 1 tr into the same space, * 2 tr into next space (repeat * to end), sl st into 3rd ch (48 stitches)

Round 4: 3 ch and 1 tr into the same space, * 2 tr into next space (repeat * to end), sl st into 3rd ch, fasten off and sew in yarn ends (96 stitches).

Note: Poppies need to be about 20cm diameter but could be larger. Use any thick yarn you may have such as Arran but with a larger crochet hook than usual. If the poppy doesn't seem large enough, then crochet an extra round.

St Peter's church is visible, and that was constructed between 1883/4, and the extension to the Wesleyan Chapel had not even been started, which was opened in 1885. The above picture is one of the earliest of the village and these features pin it down to a very narrow window of between 1883 and 1884. The roofscape is very similar to today, but there are a few noticeable differences. Two prominent buildings yet to be built at the bottom of Meadowstile Lane (13), are Chicago House and The Sibbys in Rose Hill. Today, these dwarf Geldenhuis (15) at the top of Dolphin Street, where it meets Rose Hill, with Chicago House on the upper side, and The Sibbys on the seaward side. The Wesleyan Chapel extension would soon fill the gap between Creel Cottage (26) and the smaller original chapel (27) at the end of Middle Street. There is an interesting old building, which looks like it has four storeys, between 19-21

Rose Hill (14) and Valencia House (1) that is no longer here. Behind Bottlenose and Dolphin Cottages (25) in Dolphin Street can be seen two long double storeyed buildings going back towards Middle Street, which are long gone. The 1839 Tithe Map showed them as non-domestic buildings, part of Zebuses tenement. The old sheds alongside Brook Cottage (29) have been cleared away to form the open space below the Manor House.

A Tribute to Dave Myers

I want to start this months trio with a tribute to Dave Myers who sadly passed this last month. I've enjoyed watching him and his partner Si on TV for several years with their program the hairy bikers. DAVE's enthusiasm for food and people I found totally enthralling so I thought I'd do one of their recipes which is a favourite of mine ...



Salmon with chilli & ginger sauce

Oily fish such as salmon is a great choice when when you're watching your weight the bear in mind it carries more calories than white fish but it's high in protein and it's therefore fills you up especially when it's teamed up with this tiny sticky sauce.

Ingredients: 2 balls stem ginger in syrup and tbsp of the syrup

3tbsp dark soy sauce

Freshly squeezed juice of one orange, about 125ml

4 x 125 -150g salmon fillets, skin on

3 garlic cloves

Finely grated zest of ½ well scrubbed orange

½" long red chilli thinly sliced Freshly ground black pepper

Method:

Pile of the slices from each ball of ginger and cut through them to make thin matchstick strips. Put these in a bowl that is large enough to hold the salmon and add 2tbsp of the stem ginger syrup. Peel the garlic cloves and sliced and thinly then add them to the bowl. Stir in the soy sauce, orange juice, orange zest and red chilli.

Add the salmon in the bowl and season with lots of ground black pepper. Turn a couple of times ending with the fish skinside up then cover and chill for 30 minutes

Preheat the oven to 220°C fan or gas 7. Line a small baking tray with baking parchment then take the salmon fillet out of the marinade scraping off any bits and pieces and place the salmon on the tray skinside down. Season with more ground black pepper and bake for 12 to 15 minutes depending on the thickness of the salmon.

While the salmon is cooking prepare the sauce by pouring the marinade into a small nonstick saucepan and bring to the boil. Simmer for 6 minutes or until the liquid is reduced and the garlic is soft. You need enough of the sauce to pour over the salmon but not to swap it completely

Put the salmon on a plate, carefully lifting off the skin as you go. Then spoon the hot sauce over salmon and serve with a small portion of rice or new potatoes and some steamed or stirfried vegetables. Lovely. Cheers boys.

Following on from my small tribute to the Hairy Bikers and their travels, I'm looking at Tapas. One of my favourites is the crispy

Chicken & Ham Croquettes

which are extremely popular throughout Spain. This recipe makes eight so here goes ...

Ingredients: 4tbsp olive oil or 2oz butter

200ml milk or 7 fluid ounces

2pz Serano or cooked ham, finely chopped

A small pinch of freshly grated nutmeg

1 beaten egg

Sunflower oil for deep frying

4tbsp plain flour

4oz cooked chicken mince

1tbsp chopped flat leaf parsley plus extra sprigs to garnish

Salt and pepper

2oz of day-old white breadcrumbs

Method:

Heat the olive oil in the saucepan Stir in the flour to form a paste and cook gently, stirring, for one minute. Remove the saucepan from the heat and stir in the milk until smooth. Return to the heat and slowly bring to the boil stirring all the time until the mixture boils.


Remove the pan from the heat and add the minced chicken and beat until the mixture is smooth. Add the chopped ham, parsley and nutmeg and mix well together. Season to taste. Leave in a dish for 30 minutes or until cool and then cover and put in the fridge for 2 to 3 hours or overnight if possible. Do not be tempted to miss out the stage as it helps to stop the croquettes falling apart when they're cooked

With dampened hands, divide the chilled chicken mixture into eight cylindrical shapes. Dip in the beaten egg and then roll in the breadcrumbs. Place on a plate and chill in the refrigerator for one hour

To cook the croquettes heat the oil in a deep fryer to 180° to 190°C or until a cube of bread browns in 30 seconds. Add the croquettes in batches to prevent the temperature of the oil dropping and fry for 5 to 10 minutes. Remove from the fryer with a slotted spoon and drain well on kitchen paper.

Serve the Chicken & Ham Croquettes piping hot garnished with parsley sprigs and accompanied by a bowl of aoli for dipping.





St Endellion Parish Council Contract & Maintenance Supervisor Report

I'm not sure what happened to my report last month, but a big chunk was missing! I know there's so much packed into each issue of *Trio*, maybe it got squeezed out! *Ed: Sorry Clare, I did print everything you sent me ... I did think you had been a bit brief ...*

Anyway, to recap:The storms and 'sustained rain', as I heard it described recently, seem to have taken its toll around the parish. The play area, football field and most of the footpaths, are totally sodden. I've even taken pity on my dogs, so sometimes they get to stay inside on the sofa while I'm out and about invariably getting soaked! But things still need to be done, such as the play area monthly inspection. The multi-play has had a few minor repairs carried out and the fireman's pole has had a lick of paint.

I've walked some of the footpaths, even where it gets really muddy, but I'm probably the only person silly enough to be out there! The dogs enjoy this no matter how muddy! And it looks easier trying not to slip over with four legs!

The Leat in Middle Street is regularly checked, more so with all the rainwater. I've had to climb in a couple of times to remove some vegetation that had blocked the gate and was preventing the water flowing through properly. It didn't quite fill my wellies!

You may see, if you're in Middle Street, a notice attached to the temporary fence around the damaged bridge over the stream. It's for a planning application to carry out the repair, but don't get too excited. Assuming the permission is given there may be a Cornwall Council budget issue to overcome.

In between the showers Phil B and I have carried out work to remove weeds from a few places around Port Isaac. We started in New Road then we tackled the path that runs beside the Co-op and joins New Road to Tintagel Terrace, followed by Hartland Road. Cornwall Council played ping pong with my emails when I asked who's responsibility the pavements are. So I figured it would be less hassle to just do them! We've trimmed back the crab apple trees at the top of Port Gaverne Hill too.

Some of the bank at the bottom of Back Hill has come down. At first it was a little pile, which Cornwall Council were made aware of. They put a small temporary fence around it, more ground slipped down and now it has a bigger fence. Don't know what the solution will be at the moment; there seems to be an ownership issue. And towards the top of Port Gaverne Hill the end of the wooden fence needs repairing. It's been tied up with a large strap to prevent it getting worse, as a temporary measure, so I'm told.

One Sunday I spent a couple of hours litter picking the lay-by and grass verge at the top of Poltreworgey Hill near the junction to the B3314 and was joined by an enthusiastic volunteer. It makes the work much more enjoyable with company! So thanks to them. Between us we filled eight black bags with rubbish. There was also a large pile of tarmac dumped there. I reported this to Cornwall Council, initially they were reluctant to deal with it, but I'm hoping that it should be gone by now.

The grass verge that I mentioned and the one opposite Poltreworgey Farm have both had some more extensive work carried out. This is part of an ongoing management plan for the verges financed by the Parish Council. To encourage a wider biodiversity and to improve conditions for the trees.

So, now, up to date. There's a new noticeboard in the shelter at Mine Pit Corner (the junction of Back Hill and Trewetha Lane). This is for flyers for charity/social events in the parish. Please don't use it for commercial enterprises as the ads will be removed.

The contract for the cleaning of the toilet blocks in the parish is going to be changed to a new service provider at the beginning of April. The work that this change entailed was mostly carried out by the Clerks from St Minver parishes, as all three parishes will have the same contractor, and I would like to thank them for their hard work in this.

I met the boss of the new cleaning company and showed him the loos in Port Isaac and Port Gaverne. There was a lot of info for him to take on board, but thankfully he has relatives that live in Port Isaac, so he understands the peculiarities of working here.

The only other meeting attended was for the Full Parish Council. I was able to update the Councillors on the progress made with the loos on Roscarrock Hill, to refurbish them. I'm still hoping that the facility will be open in time for the Easter holidays, fingers crossed, even if there's



no paying system installed. People will have the luxury of peeing for free!

One of the Biffa street operatives was very pleased to be able to show me a new mechanical street cleaner, visiting Port Isaac on a test drive. It's a smaller machine and capable of getting to the more difficult to reach places. They travelled around most of the streets in the zones that Biffa clean on behalf of Cornwall Council. including Roscarrock Hill and Church Hill. It certainly did a great job.

The toilets haven't created many problems in the past month. One door at New Road had to have a latch replaced. But there have been a few miscellaneous things that I've been able to deal with, reporting to Cornwall Council: several large pot holes, a blocked drain, a broken street light, two lots of standing water, one was a huge flood at Port Quin and the other is the area that often floods along the road at St Endellion to Trelights, just after Pennants Farm. These two will require further work to improve the dispersing of water that collects, so I hope to be able to update any progress when I can.

Parish Council Chair Report

Cllr Raynor briefly outlined his annual report which will be prepared for next month's annual meeting, due to take place immediately prior to the monthly PC meeting.

Cllr Raynor has had a visit from individuals organising the elections for the next Police and Crime Commissioner for Devon and Cornwall. The Village Hall is not available on the dates required. Cllr Raynor suggests a portacabin for the hard standing area in the Main car park as the last location used was not clearly visible to voters. Access to a 30-amp socket is required for power. The next elections are due to take place on May 3rd. The PC hasn't received any further communication regarding this.

Cllr Raynor is hopeful the Roscarrock refurbishment will be on track for completion around Easter time.

Divisional Member Report - Cllr Mould is absent from the meeting.

Playing Field Development Working Party Report - Cllr Button is absent from the meeting.

STEND HWG Report

Cllr Williams report will include 'notes ref a meeting 12/03/24, with Planning Officer Fionna Caitlin/ Dave Slatter/Affordable Housing Team & CCLT to discuss bringing Glebe Farm proposals forward under a Community Led Development Framework (to be agreed by attending parties) in line with revised NPPF policy. Once an agreement is reached, I will be requesting more funds from the PC to facilitate.'

Cllr Williams has attended a training session organised by the Community Land Trust. There are changes to the NPPF (National Planning Policy Framework). Cllr Williams explained to the PC the meeting scheduled is delayed until March 14th. This will include the case officer who will be providing a service requiring payment, this will be taken from the HWG reserve.

Cllr Williams reiterates the news of the positive pre app from Glebe Farm discussed in last month's meeting.

Two issues were reported to Western Power Distribution: one in Fore Street between Cloam Cottage and Fee's, where a cover had blown off during a storm revealing an exposed junction of important looking cables. The other is an ongoing one in Postman's Walk. For a long time there has been exposed yellow 'caution' tape on the footpath and more recently plastic ducting, which carries electricity cables has been exposed due to the surface of the path being eroded by the rain water. Western Power came out the same day and I was able to show them the problems. The junction box cover was immediately replaced and the exposed ducting was logged as requiring attention due to needing more than a quick fix.

And sadly, there was quite a large and badly decayed dead porpoise on Port Gaverne beach, I reported it to Cornwall Wildlife Trust who tagged it and the National Trust who arranged for its removal.
