





Websites of the Month

With so many changes going on in the world right now I thought I would devote this column to some ancient history of Cornwall and what can be found online to give some perspective. The scientific advances in archaeology have thrown new light on Cornwall's past and with the digitisation of so much of the old materials, hitherto only accessible by scholars, it is amazing what you can now see.

The British Library, despite being the recent victim of a cyber-attack (<u>https://tinyurl.com/BL-</u> <u>cybercrime</u> has beautiful old manuscripts from Cornwall. Two blogs that include some of the earliest written records from Cornwall which go by the name of the Bodmin Gospels or Manumissions can be seen and these date back to Medieval times.

The first blog is by Chantry Westwell and you can see her in a discussion on The British Library YouTube channel (<u>https://</u> tinyurl.com/Myths-and-<u>manuscipts</u>) talking more generally about medieval manuscripts in The British Library's collection.

Her blog is entitled "Slavery and Sainthood in Cornwall" which describes these old documents and their origin (see image). She explains that they were originally written in Brittany and brought to

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Cornwall in the early 9th century and in addition to being called the Bodmin Gospels they are also referred to as the St Petroc Gospels. It was originally used for swearing of oaths at the Priory of St Petroc. The blog gives a detailed history of St Petroc's Priory and how Christianity was established in Cornwall and you can also read about it on this link as well <u>https://tinyurl.com/St-Petroc-Priory</u>

The Gospels record the freeing of slaves - 51 of them - between 950 and 1025. They are written in Latin and Old English but names included ones in Celtic. The examples given are Wurci - from the Welsh Gwrgi meaning 'man-dog' and Modred, named apparently for King Arthur's nephew.

The second blog from 2019 entitled "New records of slavery from Anglo-Saxon Cornwall" (<u>https://tinyurl.com/Bodmin-gospels-blog2019</u>) describes the new techniques that have made it possible to read them in more detail. You can follow the author of this blog, Becky Lawton on Twitter/X <u>https://twitter.com/bbeckyL</u>. The technique she describes, known as multispectral imaging, "has revealed previously erased additions to a 9th-century gospel-book, known as the Bodmin Gospels. These additions, known as manumissions, record the freeing of medieval slaves." You can read more about these techniques in an article in Science Magazine <u>https://tinyurl.com/science-mag-gospels</u>. In fact recently there have been even more dramatic advances this year (<u>https://tinyurl.com/new-technique-scrolls</u>) but those are on ancient scrolls not on Cornish ones (perhaps yet).

One example of what can now be read now in the Bodmin Gospels that were completely unreadable before is (in translation) "This is the name of that woman, Guenenguith, and her son whose name is Morcefres, who[m] Bishop Comoere freed on the altar of St Petroc for the redemption of his soul in the presence of these witnesses: Beorhtsige priest, Mermen priest, Athelces priest, Saithred cleric, Cenmen cleric, Heden deacon, Ryt deacon." It's almost like being a time traveller and this must have been a big day for Guenenguith and Morcefres.

For our local history there is no better place than <u>https://</u> www.portisaacheritage.co.uk so please do have a look there as well.



As background, Port Isaac's *Hands on Hooks* community skills share started in October as a one-off Fun Palace event, which now continues regularly, welcoming everyone from the community of Port Isaac and the surrounding areas. We have settled onto *The Golden Lion*, which is very welcoming, with lots of interested folk dropping in to see us. Later in the year we will be using some larger venues to give us space to complete our Grand Project!

Another of *Hands on Hooks*' aims is to encourage the community to work together in a Grand Project which will benefit the community in some way. This year we are creating an installation of giant poppies to mark Remembrance Day 2024. This will require an enormous number of poppies to be crocheted or knitted by the end of September, then stitched onto nets, ready to display mid-October. The plan is to create displays at the War Memorial, on the Platt and in St Peter's Church, depending on how many poppies we have.

We hope that you enjoyed making poppies from the patterns in recent *Trios*. This month, there is a crochet pattern for a cupped shape poppy which we hope will be fun to make. > Hands on Hooks Grand Project: Large Poppies for the Platt for Remembrance Day 2024 **Crocheted Cupped Poppy pattern**

To make a large poppy, crochet with 2 strands of Double Knit (DK) yarn throughout to make the poppy robust. Use an 8-10mm crochet hook for a poppy of about 15cm diameter. We have used acrylic yarn to withstand the weather! Note: Use any thick

Yarn: Colour A – Black, Colour B – Red

Crochet stitches used (UK): slip stitch, chain stitch, treble stitch, double treble stitch

Using Colour A (black)

Make 4 chains, slip stitch into first chain to form a loop (or form magic loop)

Round 1: 4 chains, 11 double-trebles into the loop, slip stitch into 4th chain, fasten off (12 stitches including first 4 chain)

Change to Colour B (red)

Round 2: Attach yarn to any stitch space in the circle, 4 chains and 1 double-treble into the same space, * 2 double-trebles into next space, (repeat * to end), slip stitch into 4th chain, turn (24 stitches including first 4 chain)

Round 3: 3 chains and 1 treble into same space, *1 treble into next space, 2 trebles into following space, (repeat from * to last stitch space), 1 treble into final stitch space, slip stitch into 3rd chain, turn (36 stitches including first 3 chain)

Hanging baskets can give an array of colour wherever they are hung - garden, walkway or by the front door. You can create flower displays for the season or use them for tomatoes, herbs and strawberry plants or even shrubs and evergreens.

Hanging baskets are simple and easy to do!

Start with lining your basket with moss or coco matting and fill with peat free multipurpose compost. Placing a dominant specimen in the centre with spreading flowering and foliage plants will help to create structure and impact. Trailing plants tumbling over the edge of the basket works too.

Design the basket around a specific colour, or use several coloured plants. Plants to use include pansy, petunias, geranium, fuchsia, busy Lizzie, lobelia, bedding begonias. You can also use a tumbling variety of Cherry tomatoes as they thrive in hanging baskets, as do strawberry plants.

Once planted, baskets need to be checked daily as they tend to dry out very quickly so water accordingly. Deadhead the plants regularly.

Did you know?

Many believe that the Hanging Gardens of Babylon are the inspiration behind the modern day hanging basket. The story goes that King Nebuchadnezzar built the gardens to cheer up his homesick wife. Legend says these exquisite, tiered gardens of trees, shrubs, and vines resembled a sloping mountain landscape.

The longest day of the year falls on June 21st, bringing (hopefully!) warmer temperatures and extra sunlight; flowers are blossoming, there's lots to harvest in the vegetable garden and weeds are plentiful, so it's best to keep on top of them.

Other jobs to do in June -

Keep sowing salad leaves and the trick is to sow little and often with fortnightly intervals throughout the summer.

Dead heading rhododendrons and azaleas is a laborious job, but it pays dividends. Many of them look ugly when they have finished flowering, because they are left covered with dead brown flowers and in addition to improving their appearance - deadheading will encourage maximum flowering next season.

Tomato plants - nip off the side shoots to encourage healthy but controlled production along the main stem, which must be securely tied to a cane (but not too tightly). Apply a high-potash liquid fertiliser weekly when the first flowers appear.

Dahlias, chrysanthemums and other late summer flowering specials will be growing and they need support so it is a good idea to put a stake in place now before the plants are too big and risk damaging the flowers that have formed.

The song thrush is a small, familiar songbird, commonly find in parks, gardens, woodland and shrub. Living up to its common name, it has a beautiful and loud song.

Song thrushes will eat all kinds of food, but earthworms make up a large part of their diet. When the ground becomes too hard to get at them, song thrushes will eat snails instead. To get at the meat inside, they take the shell and crack it open by banging it against a stone 'anvil'. This behaviour is unique to these birds.

Also, our swallows are back in our garage for the fourth year running - will let you know how they get on this season



St Endellion Parish Council Contract & Maintenance Supervisor Report

Another Bank Holiday and another half term, the year certainly seems to be whizzing by. The hedgerows are looking amazing and the evenings are staying light til late. Visitors are able to enjoy the parish without it being too busy and locals still have time to stop for a chat and a catch-up. Although some of my conversations revolve around toilets, car parks and dog poo! No one's mentioned the General Election coming up yet ...

Having been able to walk the footpaths in the past couple of weeks armed with my trusty secateurs I've tried to keep on top of the vegetation, but it's tricky as everything is growing so fast at the moment. The Groundwork team will be visiting the parish on a weekly basis soon, weather permitting, and I hope they'll be able to get overgrowing vegetation under control.

In Trewetha valley two quite large trees had come down, they almost blocked the path so had to be removed. Please be wary of the nettles and hogweed when you're out walking, both of which can cause minor, but irritating rashes on bare skin.

In Port Isaac some of the smaller alleys which were cleared recently are starting to need attention again, so I'm hoping to get them done in the next couple of weeks. If there's any areas which I've missed or are getting out of hand please let me know via the contact details at the end of this article.

At the play area the annual inspection by RoSPA was carried out at the beginning of May. The report showed a few minor defects, but that is to be expected. These things will be checked and work carried out to resolve them.

Following the Shanty Festival there were a few little things needed to be sorted in the football field. The goalposts were put back, loose straw was cleared and a few random items were removed, including a plastic green garden chair, two bread shelves the type supermarkets use and a traffic cone! (thank you Clare!)

During the past month the ticket machines in the Main car park have had a few issues. These were fixed by an engineer, who was very pleased to be working in a car park with such amazing views. It was sunny and I explained it wouldn't be so much fun when there's horizontal rain coming in!

The new sign for the Parish Council owned section of the cemetery at St Endellion Church has arrived and will be erected in the coming weeks. Plus the groundwork team are aware of the work to be carried out in the autumn to spruce the area up a little.

I mentioned fly-tipping in last months *Trio* and there's a couple more things I'd like to tell you. The email ping-pong regarding the mattresses in a gateway near St Endellion has come to a halt with Cornwall Council claiming the land where they are is in private ownership. They haven't given any information about who could be responsible for removing them or how to get rid of them. So I'm trying to figure out how to do this, I hope they won't be there for much longer. And the other thing is that someone has put a sign up in the lay-by at Poltreworgey saying, 'Keep Port Isaac tidy please take your litter home'. I thought it was put up by the person who's helped me litter pick a couple of times, but they've denied it was them, so whoever you are I'd like to say 'thank you'. I was back there before the sign went up and collected another 4 black bags of rubbish. So let's hope the notice makes a difference.

I haven't been to many meetings this month, the Full Parish Council one and a couple of meetings with the Groundwork team to discuss work priorities. Also one on the Main to finalise the position of a new memorial bench with the family of the person to whom the bench will be dedicated. This will be the last one to be positioned on the headland and any new requests will have to be designated to other spaces.

Reports to Cornwall Council include; pot holes, some of them were even in St Kew parish! And road signs which have been abandoned for several months. I can confirm that the road alongtheu top, on the other side of Port Gaverne has been repaired. Let's hope it's a proper job.

Around the litter bin at Port Gaverne all the silt, sand and mud had been removed, so you won't need wellies to be able to put something in the bin.

Another litter bin issue was on a weekend at the New Road car park where the Parish Council has one. There was a relief Biffa crew working who were unaware of the need to empty it. The tenant at the Deli-Box messaged me to say the bin was overflowing. I went down and decanted some of the contents before I could get the black bag out of the bin. I contacted Biffa who then reminded the crew to service this bin. The tenants at Deli-Box

were really helpful in sorting this out which saved me having to make more trips to the car park.

The broken bollard on Little Hill has been removed and a new metal post with a Cornish Crest on it has been installed. It looks very smart and I'm surprised it was done so quickly as I was told it 'might be' done before the summer holidays.

The land slip on Back Hill should also get some attention soon too. Ownership hasn't been confirmed yet, but Cornwall Council Highway's Dept has carried out a structural survey and established that there shouldn't be any further collapse, so as an interim measure they are arranging for a JCB and lorry to remove all the loose material and reseed the area with the hope this will grow and create a natural barrier to stop further slippages. The pedestrian barrier will then also be removed.

Cornwall Council Highway's have also agreed to allow the sign to guide pedestrians at Central Garage, New Road to be brought down a little. At the moment it's so high you'd need to be about 7 feet tall to see it!

And they're arranging for work to be carried out on Church Hill to unblock the drainage channel along one side, which should help with the rain water and give more space for vehicles.

The other place where work has been carried out is on the beach at Port Quin. It was a bit of a mystery for a while. There was a mini digger in the car park and there were track marks on the beach. But nothing to indicate who or why. I contacted the National Trust and they confirmed that it was work to improve the conditions around the bridge where the road goes over.

As for Roscarrock Hill public toilets work is ongoing behind the scenes to get the project finished. The payment system which is on order, a handrail for the steps and a barrier for the large opening on what used to be the Ladies to fit around the entrance/exit gate. New windows, which have been installed.

There isn't much else to say about the other loos except that I've had some keys cut for the new cleaning company and I've checked in with the Parish Clerks at St Minver to see if

they are happy with how the new company is working out and they are as satisfied as I am with their services, which is a relief!

Port Isaac's Cornish V

Cornish Wrestling, or 'Wrasslin' is the ancient sport of Cornwall, dating back a thousand years or more. Geoffrey of Monmouth's 12th Century *History of the Kings of Britain* relates how the first legendary ruler of Cornwall, Corineus, wrestled the Cornish giant, Gogmagog and threw him off a clifftop to be dashed on the rocks. Richard Carew's 1602 *Survey of Cornwall* gave this comment on the sport –

⁶Wrastling is as full of manliness, more delightful and less dangerous than hurling, for you shall hardly find an assembly of boyes in Devon and Cornwall, where the most untowardly amongst them will not as readily give you a muster of this exercise as you are prone to require it.⁹

Wrestling was a feature of Port Isaac's *Holicome Fair* at Whitsun, but we also had an annual Cornish Wrestling tournament in August, continuing well into the 1930s. There were other annual competitions held nearby at Bodmin, Delabole, Padstow, St Kew, St Mabyn and Wadebridge, with county events at St Austell, St Columb and Truro. It seems 19th century competitions were lively affairs, as the 'Wadebridge Notes' column of the 3rd August 1901 edition of the Cornish and Devon Post recorded -

The bruising, fighting, drinking bouts of former times have almost disappeared. We notice a revival this week at St Kew of the old custom of wrestling. It is considered by some a manly sport, but this feeling is not general in our district. The majority of the people in this locality look on it as a revival of that which is brutal and debasing. We well remember those wrestling scenes of old, when droves of rough men would come from Delabole, St Breward, Port Isaac and elsewhere to pull and drag each other around the ring and end it in drunkenness and fighting. To-day Delabole doesn't produce that type, or Port Isaac either to any extent.

This change was put down to the growing Temperance movement at that time.

In Victorian times, women were briefly banned from attending Cornish Wrestling matches as the men wrestled in their long johns, a spectacle not deemed suitable for ladies. The newspapers always seemed to be amazed at how many women attended the event, with the report of Port Isaac's 1928 competition having the byline 'INTERESTED LADY SPECTATORS' and stating

[•]A surprising feature was the proportion of ladies present. Port Isaac coming very near to creating a record in this respect. Their interest, too, was as keen and sustained as that of the male members of the company.[•]

This hardly surprises me as, in the 1960s, my mother avidly watched *ITV World of Sport's* Saturday afternoon coverage of professional wrestling, with the tones of Kent Walton echoing round the house as Mick McManus made yet another foul move. Most of the ringside spectators were women, and this show had audiences of up to 14 million a week, with our late Queen, the Queen Mother, and Margaret Thatcher reported to be keen viewers.

The earliest newspaper report of Port Isaac's annual event was in the Cornishman of 16th August 1906 -

WRESTLING AT PORT ISAAC

Port Isaac annual wrestling matches took place on Saturday in a field at Shortlane. There was a large attendance, and some very good sport was shown. There were sixteen entries, some of the competitors coming from Plymouth. The winners were: Sid Chapman, St Wenn £3 [about £300 today]. J Pinn, St Wenn £2. S Mitchell, Port Isaac, £1. W Bishop, Par, 12s. 6d. Brown, St. Minver, 7s. 6d.

Sidney Chapman was six times champion of Cornwall between 1903 and 1920 as well as champion of the US in 1911 and of South Africa in 1911 and 1912.

Port Isaac's premier wrestler was John Glover. One of his feats of strength, was to lift a hundredweight (50kg) sack of corn onto a trailer, with his teeth! At the National Championships held at St Austell on 11th September 1926, John Glover became the Middleweight Champion of Great Britain. There was a crowd of around 1,000 to witness the match, described in the Cornish Guardian of 17th September thus -

In the middleweight championship of Great Britain (men not exceeding 160 lbs.) for the championship belt, value 30 guineas, presented by Mr A M Williams, MP, and the championship gold medal, value £5, a surprise in the first bout of the contest was the defeat of the holder E C Williams of St Merryn, by J Glover of Port Isaac, who, after throwing two other opponents, won the championship. Glover and Williams wrestled warily for half-an-hour, each seeking for an opening, the one eager to keep his title and the other aspiring to the honour. Finally, Glover successfully brought down his man with a well-executed inside back crook, which somewhat unexpected feat, won the praise of the spectators. In the final round of the contest Glover threw T Richards, of Old Pound with a very fine example of the under-heave.

Results - First round - J Glover. Port Isaac threw E C Williams, St Merryn; W J Williams, St Hilary gave his back to T Richards. Old Pound; H Gregory. St Wenn threw A Warne, St Columb; A M Mitchell. Port Isaac threw H Old, Colan. Round 2 - J Glover threw H Gregory; T Richards threw A M Mitchell. Round 3 - J. Glover threw T Richards. Champion, J Glover; 2, T Richards.

At the 1930 Port Isaac Annual Tournament, John Glover met up with the Heavyweight Champion, Francis Gregory, who was champion from 1928 to 1936, and one of the all-time greats of the sport. The sporting manner in which their match was played was described in the Cornish Guardian of 21st August –

Vrestling past

Gregory is to be commended for attending at Port Isaac. On the same day there was a tournament at Falmouth. He could have gone there with an excellent chance of winning the first prize and with no sacrifice of prestige. But he chose to meet Glover at the latter's own village and, as matters transpired, went away prizeless. It was the action of a real sportsman and one on which he is warmly to be commended. At their two previous meetings this season Francis Gregory and Glover had each been successful on one occasion. On Saturday. however, the Port Isaac man had the better of matters throughout. Two or three times he gave Gregory good turns before finally throwing him with a back heave. Gregory's defeat, however, was also the occasion for the demonstration of his fine sportsmanship. It is not difficult to imagine the significance both men set upon the encounter and the spectators had shown that they were undoubtedly supporters of Glover. Yet immediately Gregory rose from the ground his first action was to extend his hand to clasp that of his triumphant rival. However wrestling may compare with other sports in popular appeal, there can be no doubt its exponents are second to none in the vital matter of sportsmanship.

PORT ISAAC.

This is in the best traditions of the Cornish Wrestling Oath 'gwary whek yu gwary tek' usually translated as 'good play is fair play'.

In the 1931 Port Isaac Tournament, John Glover had to retire with a broken rib in the second round, although he retained his Middleweight title at the County championships held at Newquay on 1st August 1932. He did not compete in the 1932 Port Isaac tournament a few weeks later, owing to physical incapacity but acted as one of the sticklers (referees). He was not mentioned in the report of the 1933 tournament, so likely did not compete. In the 1934 tournament the Cornish Guardian of 16th August reported -

The Port Isaac man is still somewhat handicapped by an old injury to his ribs, but from the outset both men went "all out." For 45 minutes they engaged in a deadly keen struggle, so keen in fact as to warrant the adjective grim, without either being able to claim any real advantage. The end came rather unexpectedly. Hawkey throwing Glover in a manner which was rather surprising after the stout and successful resistance the Port Isaac man had offered to that stage.

He was again not mentioned in Port Isaac's 1935 tournament, which was marred by a tragic event, as reported in the *Cornish Guardian* of 8th August -

While Wrestling in the prize rounds. Mr. Henry Paul Ralph. of Bodmin fell and was unable to regain his feet. When Ralph collapsed, he had as his opponent Steve Glover. of Port Isaac, a strong and determined wrestler, but although the bout was keen it was being contested in the best of spirit and there was little to choose between the men either in strength or weight. Certainly, there were no unfair tactics employed and Glover was much distressed at the misfortune which befell his game opponent.

A London doctor was in the audience and immediately attended Ralph, then drove him to hospital in Bodmin. Sadly, Ralph died that same evening. At the inquest, all witnesses agreed that there had been no foul play. The post mortem revealed that Ralph had a fracture running around the base of the skull, which was the cause of his death. The Coroner was satisfied that the rules of wrestling had been followed and there was no malice involved. A verdict of accidental death was returned by the jury.

A Port Isaac tournament was held in 1937, but I have found no later reference. Immediately after the war, there were wresting tournaments restarted at Par in September 1945 and at St Merryn in 1946. St Kew had a tournament in 1949, with newspaper reports confirming it was still being held at least until 1964. There seems to have been a general waning of the sport within the county, as the Cornish Guardian of 1st May 1958 reported that the Cornish Wrestling Association was investigating the decline in Cornish Wrestling. It is not the major county sport it once was, but there is currently a Cornish Wrestling Facebook page, with 1,800 followers and they are holding a tournament at St Merryn on 22nd June, as well as other events later in the year.

Monthly Parish Council Meeting - Parish Council Chair Report

Cllr Raynor does not have anything to report other than what is already covered on the agenda. He informs members about an email from a family requesting a memorial bench on the coast path. Ms Jon has suggested the playing field as the only spot with space available. Members agree but Cllr Button highlights that they may need to be moved when work starts on the playing field.

Divisional Member Report

Cllr Mould cannot be present this evening but has emailed information she would like members to be made aware of. Cllr Raynor reads the email to members.

There is an online briefing on 3rd June regarding the Tax Premium on Second Homes. I think it will be really helpful if as many as possible attend to understand the exemptions and the impact on PC's when setting next year's precept. Also, the local Planning Training on 13th June as again there is an element around short term lets. There are quite a few changes coming down the line and given the amount of second homes/letting properties there are in our Parishes I think we need to be fully aware and prepared. There is also a change around Planning Enforcement Immunity periods, but I think a paper has already been circulated regarding those changes. Lastly just to remind everyone we are in No Mow May, so the verges will look a little over grown for another couple of weeks.'

The Clerk to ask for slides or recording of 3rd June meeting for those that are unable to attend. Cllrs: Williams, Raynor and Pierpoint agree attendance.

Playing Field Development Working Party Report

The Local Residents' Group have completed their own survey which garnered 115 responses. The next stage is to review the feedback. Cllr Button will then revisit the plans with an architect and then use a quantity surveyor to assess affordability (how to fund the project, any grants it may be eligible for, whether it will be completed incrementally or all at once, etc).

An overview of the survey shows the desire for a Community Hub with a kitchen, able to provide service for 50 covers. A member's area to incorporate a bar, a pool table, and Sky TV. A main room/coffee lounge to allow all activities to run alongside one another (youth and adult). A main shower area for stage two of the build, a 5m squared gym area and one unisex shower unit. Internal storage to be available and external storage for BBQ equipment. The building should be designed to be extended if the need arises. Key point raised is the eastward side with the patio to be positioned away from residents. There will be a meeting arranged with the architect and Local Residents' Group. Cllr Collings adds the importance of a youth club area and the design of a member's bar situated centrally where visitors can have access to the other side. Cllr Williams raises the necessity to assess the quantifiable data before planning goes ahead.

STEND HWG Report

Cllr Williams confirms the topography surveys have been completed, shared the images, and outlined the next steps.

- Archaeological survey/ground penetrating radar to identify any areas of disturbance which will establish if there are 'no go' areas.
- Identifying massing/volumes options/land take/thumbnail sketches.
- Cornwall Estates Management (CCEM) advise overlaying the topographic studies with thumbnail sketches to gauge massing/quantum of development types/LW/ commercial to establish internal clearance to progress. Cllr Williams confirms verbal agreement was established in principle before initiating the plan.
- The need is to evolve the principle of development into a robust strategy with a feasibility study, to establish the scale.
- It is expected a Special Purpose Vehicle/s (SPV) will be used to establish an overarching partnership to establish a framework including Cornwall Community Land Trust (CCLT.) to be responsible for design detail.
- Further discussion with CCLT is required to set up the legal mechanism.

Camel Valley Community Area Partnership Report

Cllr Raynor attended the recent meeting. They discussed the Levelling Up Fund of £645,000 with applications totalling over £3,000,000. There was an update from Cornwall Police. Regarding community transport, there is one bus to accommodate 490 trips per year, they are looking for more funding and volunteers. The cycle scheme has routes already marked. Any projects previously funded need to be finished by December 2024. Cllr Smith attended training on funding applications and can hopefully discuss further at the next meeting. The meeting highlighted the sewage discharge into the Camel River.

Due to sand movement, there is a long-term concern that 'silting' in the harbour may eventually affect access to Padstow. The next meeting will be the AGM in Bodmin with time and date TBC.

Poached side of Salmon with Asparagus and Brown Shrimps

serves eight people

Ingredients: Butter for greasing next One small bunch of dill 2 lb 3 oz side of salmon fillet with the skin on Juice of one lemon Salt-n-Pepper

For the dressing: Half a banana shallot finely diced 2 teaspoons of Dijon mustard 3 tablespoons of white wine vinegar 2 fluid ounces of white wine Five fluid ounces of light olive oil 1 teaspoon of castor sugar One bunch of chopped dill

To garnish: you will need 20 asparagus tips cut in half, 4oz of cooked peeled brown shrimps patted dry. Pink radishes sliced or pink micro herbs.

Method:

Preheat the oven to 180°C or 160°C in a fan oven or gas mark 4.

Lightly butter a large sheet of foil big enough to wrap the salmon in and place in a roasting tin. If you don't have a roasting tin large enough for the length of salmon, a grill pan makes a good alternative.

Place of dill in the centre of the foil then season the foil and place the salmon on top skinside up.

Pour over the wine and lemon juice and bring the two long edges of the foil together and fold the edges scrunching them into a parcel sealing the edges like a Cornish pasty.

Place in the oven to poach for 25 minutes until the salmon is just cooked with the fish being pale pink and opaque then leave to rest for 10 minute.

Remove the skin, pulling it off in one piece if possible and use a pallet knife to scrape off grey fat.

Next blanch the asparagus tips in a saucepan of boiling water for three minutes then drain and refresh under cold water.

Mix all of the dressing ingredients together in a jug and season well.

Using two fish slices transfer the salmon to a serving platter and arrange the asparagus along the fish then scatter the shrimps over and spoon on some dressing along with radish and micro herbs and serve in a room temperature with the additional dressing in a jug.

A couple of helpful hints are make sure you have a good seal around the edges of the foil parcel before baking to ensure no steam escapes and also it's easier to remove the salmon skin while it's still warm because if the salmon cools down the skin will stick firmly to the flesh and quite possibly will rip it.

Beetroot and carrot slaw



this one also goes particularly well with a home-made beef burger

Ingredients: 4 tbsp of full fat mayonnaise 2 tsp of Dijon mustard 1 tsp of hot horseradish sauce One squeeze of lemon juice 1 tsp of sugar

One large carrot peeled and coarsely grated 5oz of raw beetroot peeled and coarsely grated Two celery sticks very finely chopped Two spring onions chopped 3 tbsp of chopped parsley

Method: to make the slaw, measure the mayonnaise, mustard and horseradish sauce into a bowl add the lemon juice and sugar. Season and stir to combine.

Add the carrot, beetroot, celery, spring onions and parsley and stir until coated in the sauce. Season to taste and add more lemon juice if required. Then leave to sit for a couple of hours to allow the flavours to develop. Try it it's awesome.


